

Tip Sheet for Advisors—FRENCH Placement Test, the Language Requirement, and Course Offerings for Fall 2016 – Spring 2017

Students who place into FRENCH 101 or who have not studied French in high school:

- If your advisees took French in high school, placed into FRENCH 101, and want to fulfill their language requirement with French, they must pursue French through the intermediate level: 101, 102, 111, 112 or 110, 111, 112.
- Students who have not taken French in high school and Horizon students can fulfill the language requirement in French by successfully completing French 101-102.

Students who place into FRENCH 110:

FRENCH 110 is Accelerated Elementary French. It is a course for students who have had some French in high school but who are not quite ready for the intermediate level. 110 condenses all of the elementary year into one semester. If any of your advisees place into this course, they can complete LAN by taking: 110 (spring 2017) 111, 112.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THIS YEAR FRENCH 110 IS ONLY OFFERED IN THE SPRING SEMESTER.

Students who place into FRENCH 111 or 117:

Some of your advisees may have received a placement test score of “111” or “117.”

- Students who have taken French in high school, have placed into 111, or 117 and want to fulfill their language requirement with French must complete the full-year sequence of Intermediate French (111-112) or Advanced Intermediate French (117-118).

Students who place into the 200 level - French 274 The Francophone World

- Students who have placed into the 200 level have completed their language requirement, but we hope you will encourage them to continue studying French. They have obviously worked hard to reach this level of proficiency and it would be a shame for them not to continue with the language. With this level of placement, a student can receive a minor in French with six courses and a major with nine courses.
